The Muckleshoot Indian Tribe is comprised of the descendants of the area's original Coast Salish peoples. The Tribe has lived in this area for thousands of years, possibly since the last glaciers receded. Today's Muckleshoot Indian Tribe is one of Washington State's larger Tribes, with an on- or near-Reservation population of about 3,300.

The advent of tribal gaming has been a large factor in opening up new possibilities for Indian people everywhere, and the Muckleshoot Tribe has been very entrepreneurial in capitalizing on its urbanized location, establishing successful casino and bingo enterprises. Current outpatient programming includes: chemical dependency, mental health, problem gambling treatment, psychiatric care and medication management; we also offer outreach, advocacy, prevention services and case management. Residential programming includes the operation of a 16 bed Adult Recovery House, which is located within walking distance of the outpatient clinic.


